It is bushfire season once again, and by all predictions, this summer will be a scorcher and the fire danger levels are at Catastrophic already. There is also a total fire ban in place for the Western Downs. Police would also like to remind residents that police take no pleasure in advising occupants of dwellings potentially in the line of fire that they need to leave. It is not a personal attack on your freedom; it is a precautionary measure so that you can remain safe and, above all, alive by staying away from the raging inferno.

On the 29th of September each year police remember their fallen colleagues at Police Remembrance Day. This year was especially poignant for the police of the Western Downs Patrol Group that consists of Miles Police, Tara Police, Chinchilla Police and Dalby Police. Each one of these police stations knew Matt Arnold and Rachel McCrow personally, and Police Remembrance Day allowed the Western Downs Police Stations to take a moment and reflect on the young lives lost. The OIC of Miles Police Station wishes to thank all the members of the public who attended the Memorial Garden at Miles Station and left floral tributes as an expression of their support for police. Your acknowledgement of Police Remembrance Day means the world to police.

Domestic and Family Violence continues to be a major contributor to the calls for service for police, and Miles Police Station is not immune to a large volume of calls for service for DV related matters. Domestic Violence is the scourge of our times, and police are tasked with assisting our communities in the eradication of DV from our culture. Police cannot do this alone. It is impossible for a law enforcement agency to singlehandedly bring about cultural change in the DV sphere without the assistance of other government departments, non-government entities and, most importantly, members of the public. Without your personal input in making police aware of DV, police cannot begin the civil and criminal processes that may be required to protect aggrieved persons and children from violence perpetrated against them by the respondent. Call the Miles Police Station for less-than-urgent matters on 4622 9797, or attend the station in person to speak with your local police. The OIC of Miles Police Station has full faith in the professionalism of his workforce, as well as their capacity to conduct thorough investigations into all DV matters.

Hilary lives with her husband and their three children at the north boundary of the Western Downs region. Born and bred here, Hilary was introduced to textile making by her family at a young age, so it's no surprise that she grew up to be a talented textile artist!

After living away from the district for some time, Hilary returned to her family farm in Wandoan which inspired her to explore new forms of creativity and opportunities she may not have had when living in the city, including getting involved in workshops.

Hilary says of herself she is still in the early days of her journey as an artist. She likes to experiment with materials and style. Her exploration of new forms of creativity led her to experimenting with new media such as watercolour, which she now likes to incorporate into her textile pieces, adding to the uniqueness of her creations. At the moment her artworks are a






combination of textile, watercolours and embroidery. Hilary's inspiration comes from "still life" like a bunch of flowers or nature. "I'm just trying to make pretty images."

Having three children and living on a farm, Hilary "works within cracks of time" to create her art. Some of her artwork can be very time intensive. It all depends which medium she includes e.g. beading.

Hilary's greatest take away from art is that you use your brain in different ways. "Doing something creative is good for my overall well-being. Fear of perfection prevents you from creating. You just have to start..."

What a difference a year makes! Last year floods were preventing people from entering the Garden on occasion and this year we have had two consecutive months with zero rainfall.



Plants are now displaying their resilience to these dry conditions or showing reluctance to survive.

Our most recent focus has been on trying to control the very large cactus plants. Several months ago three officers from the local council came to the Garden to demonstrate the best methods of killing these weeds. The Garden has now purchased some equipment as recommended by these officers and attempted the slow process of injecting the trunk of these plants.

We understand that if the herbicide is injected correctly, the plant will be dead within a month.

Let's hope we achieve some success and gain much knowledge about effective techniques.

Prevention is better than a cure

It's a centuries-old adage that holds true for modern healthcare and especially for mental healthcare.

So, it's not surprising that Momentum Mental Health has been welcomed with open arms by communities within the Western Downs since opening its doors at the Chinchilla-based service in January 2023.

Wendy Green, Communications and Partnerships Manager for Momentum says GP and referral partners in the Western Downs and Darling Downs have expressed great support for the service, particularly because people don't need a diagnosis, referral, or mental health care plan to access Momentum's services.

"The bulk of GP appointments are for mental health care plans," she said. "And then their patients either can't get an appointment with a psychologist or can't afford the gap payment."

"And the non-diagnosis also works for people who believe they'll be penalised in their industry for having a mental health issue. We've removed as many barriers as possible to people being able to improve their mental health and wellbeing."

Australia Post grant helps bring the community together.

It is well documented that Australians in rural and regional areas struggled with isolation and mental health during the pandemic lockdowns. But after the lockdowns lifted, very few of the regular community events were revived and people have lost the opportunity to connect in person.

Earlier this year Senior Wellbeing Coach Davida, who is based in Chinchilla, nominated Momentum for a People of Post Grant, and in May 2023, Momentum received word that it was one of the recipients of a \$1,000 grant to go toward hosting two morning teas in the Western Downs.

"We wanted to create an opportunity for people to come together to have a bite to eat and a yarn with no pressure." Davida said. "It's just about simple connection and catching up with people."





In November 2023, Momentum will launch Hope Brewed Here, a community morning tea held in Tara and Miles to say thanks to this fabulous community who supports our services and one another.

All are welcome to attend, and people are welcome to grab and go, or stay and have a chat.

Catering for morning tea will be provided. Australia Post's People of Post Grant is helping Momentum Mental Health strengthen connections within communities.

In January 2016, the Club transitioned into Murilla Fitness Centre, as I took over coaching responsibilities when Deborah's family relocated to Ipswich. The club is affiliated with both the Queensland Weightlifting Association and the Australian Weightlifting Federation.

Membership and Training: Saints Weightlifting Club currently boasts approximately 15 members, showcasing a diverse age range from 12 years old to those aged 65 and above. Training focuses on mastering two key lifts for Olympic Weightlifting competition - the Snatch and Clean & Jerk.

Achievements and Recognition: Throughout the years, club members have excelled in competitions at various levels, including Club, State, and National. As a Coach, I have been fortunate to be selected for Coaching and Management roles with both Queensland and Australian representative teams. It is a pleasure to help our Club lifters improve and develop.

Oly in the Outback: The inaugural Oly in the Outback competition took place in 2018 and has since gained popularity among lifters from various Queensland clubs. As the only Olympic weightlifting club west of Toowoomba, Saints Weightlifting Club takes pride in organizing a unique, country-themed competition that welcomes participants of all ages and abilities.

Overall, the history of Saints Weightlifting Club is a testament to its roots, growth, and commitment to



\$10,000 Senex STEM Scholarship applications open for Surat Basin

Senex Energy is offering two Surat Basin school leavers \$10,000 each to assist them to study a STEM or STEM related university course in 2024.

Contribution from a Tara resident

What's in a name?

Residents in small rural communities that are tucked away and hidden between more established towns each have their own script on how to explain where they live. "Oh, you follow the M1 to the end, then take the third exit and follow that for about 200 km. You'll come to a little town with a giant elephant on the roof of a pub. We live about 40 minutes from there." With our town, we don't need to explain it anymore. Tara, Queensland has a name for itself, or should I say, has had a name made FOR itself in recent times.

After the tragic incidents of December 2022, where 2 Queensland Police Officers and one member of our community lost their lives, certain terms were constantly used and highlighted over different media across the nation.

Tara had a name closely related to terms like "sovereign citizen", "conspiracy theorists", and "blockies". Locals around Tara know these words well, with many of us having heard these words describe each and every resident of this wonderful community and its surrounds in a derogatory manner.

We could have blamed the media for disparaging Tara during its time of need. We could have blamed the Facebook keyboard warriors who post unnecessary comments, or share uninformative articles behind the "Anonymous" pseudonym. But we also needed to blame ourselves for using these terms within our own community.

The term "blockies" was around well before the late tragedies struck Tara. In fact, when researching Tara before buying land here, I came across it in forums where people asked "Why is the land so cheap in Tara?". Things that had nothing to do with what I came to understand the term "Blockies" referred to, but still the slur had made itself known online.

When we finally decided to finally take the leap and give up our creature comforts of Sydney living (I mean, who wouldn't love \$600+ per week rent and a minimum of 2 hour commute to work over a distance of 25km!), we moved up with the bare minimum, a second-hand camper trailer and a block of land that had little to no space to set up comfortably. But we did it anyway. It was the only way we would ever be able to provide a stable, rent-free home for our children anywhere in the future.

We moved up during the rainy period.

Did you know that canvas tents need to be "seasoned" before their first use? It prevents the seams from leaking water. Seasoned campers like us knew this, but apparently the previous owner of our trailer did not.

Did you also know that soft-floor trailers have semi-permeable floor mats? We did not. Cue weeks worth of minor flooding, where the rain was experienced more *inside* our tent than outside and we often woke up to our mattresses in pools of water only to roll over saying "at least it's warm, I'll deal with it in the morning". The only good thing was our children stayed dry, up high on the mattress atop the trailer itself.



I say the only good thing, but without experiencing the rain, we would not have met our wonderful neighbours who continue, to this day to be possibly the most supportive and helpful people we have met. They have now become family, a big part of our lives here. They sold us a caravan and allowed us to pay it off. Something that, as city converts, we had never even thought of as an option.

This triggered the start of a wave of decisions and hard yakka to get to where we are today.

Room by room was built slowly and with a lot of arguments, blood, sweat and tears. What does it matter that the build was seemingly sponsored by Afterpay? We dealt with a scorching summer, freezing winter and a mouse plague to build what we have. Yes, it's not the Taj Mahal. But my family has worked hard and earned the right to call what we built our home.

But we are still "blockies" to some people. The belittling term used to describe the people who bought the "cheap blocks" outside of town. Regardless of whether or not your home is built from a plan, regardless of whether or not you've lived in Tara your whole life, regardless of whether or not you hold a full-time job within the same community that demotes to from "local" to "blockie" merely because you drive passed Sara or Smallacombe Street to head home.

For some of us it is a choice. Like us - it was a difficult choice to give up what we had not knowing how it would end. But for others, it is not a choice. For others, life gets in the way, as it always tends to do. We make the most of whatever situation gets thrown at us.

The resilience and the strengths, the creativity and the perseverance are shown in the end results and the smiles on our children's faces.

So I ask you, what's in a name?

Tara, itself, has pulled through the recent events. The two major police incidents, destructive and catastrophic bushfires have made many residents of Tara and surrounds rally around its citizens and begin to push a more positive image out into the world. It seems to have worked, with tourists coming in droves to our humble hometown despite all the negative attention the media has instilled upon it of late. It is no longer the place to avoid. Tara is back to being Tara.

If we, as a community, can do that for an entire town, surely we can begin to change how we see its residents. "Blockie" is just a name, after all. It holds no meaning or worth.

We are residents of Tara, and Tara is our home.



Gotta go with what lives"

Thursday, 21st September 2023 saw the Murilla Garden Club visit the delightful garden of the Fitzpatrick family; made clear by the massive, railway sleeper arbour. Our first impression of what was to come! As we journeyed around the garden and listened to Callie speak it became very evident that this was, indeed, a family effort, a labour of love.



Callie is the guiding influence with her artistic flair, but it is Dan who brings home different stumps and logs from the paddocks saying, 'Where do you want to put this?' or constructs various sculptures out of whatever paraphernalia he has found. Cooper, Jada and Poppy also pitch in to help make the vision come alive; a true testament to what a family unit can achieve.



Ргіог to Callie's arrival. "Alva Downs' was the 'Bachelor Pad'. The Belah trees, oleanders, murraya hedge and stunning fuscia bougainvilleas survivors from this time. Despite first impressions, the remainder of the garden has only been in the making for 5 years.

Callie initially put the gardens in to help create a boundary for her children to play as the house is surrounded by crops. Practically, however, they are also located as far as the garden hoses reach. Tipuana,

Drunken Parrot -which provides beautiful shade-bottle. eucalypt and some palms have been added. Splashes of colour are found everywhere - peach geraniums, red hibiscus and purple status and salvias just to name a few. Jasmine unfurls along a gate and white gazanias form ground cover, while gorgeous hippeastrums and roses flourish. Callie has only ventured into roses in the last 2 years and claims her favourite rose is the beautiful Zara rose as it never stops flowering. A stunning, cream bottle brush is an oasis for bees, while butterflies enjoy the status. A quaint, cobbled pathway made by Callie and Cooper, bordered by thriving succulents, leads the way to a play area. Here, succulents dangle from an old monkey bar. Further succulents are found flourishing in a tyre rim sculpture inspired by the Bournie's own, an inclusion which speaks of the wonderful Murilla gardening community. Beautiful bromeliads echo the colours of the sunset, alongside agave, which add varietv.



The Fitzpatrick's are masters at recycling. Callie's mum went through the floods at Balina and as a result lost many of her possessions. These however, live on in Callie's garden and have their own little story to tell. Leftovers from the restumping of the house, have provided for the construction of an ornamental fence. A silo has also been repurposed to become a relaxing bar area, while old property and shearing shed gates adorn the gardens. Artistic pieces from Fitzy's Farm Art feature prominently throughout the garden such as delightful metal birds adorning flowerpots.

Callie has created an Anzac garden - so called, "Because

it originated from a conversation reminiscing about Anzac and her family". It is in this garden that Callie has planted items for her 'Dulacca Foliage'. People who have seen Callie's foliage will be familiar with the Silver Dollar Eucalypt and the Bunny Tails.



'Better Conversations' research set to help people communicate their needs

Southern Cross Care Queensland is proud to partner with a range of industry experts on an exciting research project towards ensuring aged care residents can access their basic right to be heard and understood.

With older people experiencing complex sensory, speech, language, and cognitive changes that impact their ability to communicate and participate in conversations about their care, there's a need to better support effective conversations within aged care.

There is also an opportunity to improve aged care workers' skills and resources to provide support to older people. This research project led by the University of Queensland and Dr Sarah Wallace from the National Health & Medical Research Council, aims to consistently ensure that the older person's voice is heard through a number of ways. These may include a tool for profiling the older person's communication needs, guidelines to support 'communication -friendly' care planning, feedback and complaints resolution, and resources to upskill all of us.

SCCQ's Chief of Governance, Risk and Research, Sandra Glaister, is one of the Research Steering Committee members for the project, joined by SCCQ's Jasmine Siggs based in the Western Downs region who will be participating in the Lived Experience Advisory Group.

Our collaboration with UQ and other industry partners on this important project will span over the next five years, focusing on supporting conversations about care in community and residential aged care settings.

Across three stages of research, the research team will co-design, implement, and evaluate Better Conversations, an interdisciplinary, multi-component intervention for nurses and personal care workers in home and residential care across both metropolitan and rural areas.

Other project partners include the Australian Government Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission, Wesley Mission



Queensland, the Older Person's Advocacy Network, Dementia Australia, the Ethnic Communities Council of Queensland, Speech Pathology Australia, Audiology Australia, and Southern Queensland Rural Health.





Curtis Stone's crispy pork stir-fry with_baby broccoli



Makes 4 servings | 10min prep | 10min cook

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp vegetable oil, divided
- 1 bunch baby broccoli, florets separated, stems thinly sliced.
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 3 tsp finely chopped peeled ginger
- 2 spring onions, white and green parts separated and thinly sliced
- 500g Pork Mince
- 1/4 cup (60ml) Soy Sauce
- 1 tsp Cornflour
- 1 tsp White Sugar
- 2 cups (400g) Long Grain White Rice, steamed

Method

- Heat a large heavy frying pan over high heat. Add 1 tablespoon oil. When oil is smoking, cook baby broccoli, tossing, for 2 mins or until brown in spots and crisp-tender. Transfer to a plate.
- 2. Return pan to high heat and add remaining 1 tbs oil. When oil is smoking, add garlic, ginger and white parts of spring onions. Stir for 30 secs or until fragrant. Add pork and cook, breaking up with a spoon, for 3 mins or until pork is cooked through. Spread pork in an even layer and cook, without moving, for 3 mins or until crisp underneath.
- In a small bowl, whisk soy sauce, cornflour, white sugar and 1/3 cup (80ml) water. Add to pork mixture with baby broccoli. Cook, tossing, for 30 secs. Divide rice among serving plates and spoon stir-fry over. Top with remaining spring onions.



Gluten-free chocmint cookies ripple cake

Makes 6 servings | 20min prep | 0m cook

Ingredients

- 500ml (2 cups)Thickened Cream
- 3 tbsp icing sugar mixture
- 3 tsp peppermint essence
- Green liquid food colouring, to tint
- 1 pkt Gluten Free Cookies 40% Chocolate Chips
- Aero Mint chocolate block, chopped, to decorate

Method

- Use an electric mixer to beat cream and icing sugar together in a bowl until soft peaks form. Add the peppermint essence and beat to combine. Tint with green colouring and beat until just-firm peaks form.
- 2. Spread a little cream mixture in a strip down the centre of a serving plate. Spread 1 heaped table-spoon of cream mixture over a cookie. Sandwich with another cookie. Continue layering with 2 more cookies and more cream mixture to create a stack of 4 cookies. Place the stack, on its side, crossways at the start of the strip on the plate. Repeat layering with remaining cookies and more cream mixture to create 2 more stacks, placing each stack behind last to form a log (you will have two biscuits leftover).
- Spread the remaining cream mixture over the top and sides of the log to cover. Cover loosely with foil. Place in the fridge overnight or until set.
- 4. Remove the cake from the fridge and discard foil. Decorate with chopped Aero mint chocolate. Serve immediately.
